

#### LOSS OF A MEMBER

Crosby Township Historical Society mourns the loss of member, Val McKenzie who passed away recently. He attended our meeting regularly until his illness would not allow it. Val was an avid genealogist and collector. We extend our condolences to his family. He will be missed.

#### TOWN HALL HISTORICAL MARKER

The Butler Rural Electric Cooperative has gifted CTHS with a \$500 amount toward purchasing a historical marker for the Crosby Township Town Hall. We will apply again to the Ohio Historical Connection for a grant toward the marker and hope that this year we will approved.

#### **TOWN HALL RESTORATION**

Restoration work on Crosby Township's Old Town Hall to bring it back to its original appearance continues. Previously the dropped ceiling was removed along with unnecessary ductwork. Paneling was taken down from the walls. Partition sections were removed and the debris discarded. There were two delays that halted work during the summer months. The first was the swarm of honey bees that had made a nest in the side and had to be removed. The second was the hot weather which kept workers from getting into the attic to replace the old wiring. As hot temperatures give way to cooler days, the rewiring will take place soon. Once it is complete insulation will be blown into the walls. The building will then need to be "buttoned up" for oncoming inclement weather and the furnace repaired before other work can be done.

Meanwhile, Tony Torres, Duane Singleton and Melba Guard gave a power point presentation to the township trustees at their September meeting to update them on the progress of the project. The society's board members are in the process of creating a letter to be sent to area businesses informing them of our efforts and to ask them to consider investing in this historic restoration with a donation. Our society has recently accepted one \$500 donation from a generous anonymous donor. Earl Corson added \$50 from the sale of two outdoor benches not needed by the society. The Torres family who recently sold their residence and business have donated three display cases. With these contributions and other possibilities, our objectives can be accomplished!

#### CABIN IMPROVEMENTS

We now have an electric outlet at the cabin which will be beneficial. Member, David Roessler has done considerable work on changing the stone steps at the entrance of the cabin, fixing the cabin doors to improve opening, securing loose floor boards, replacing chinking that was loose between logs, and fixing the flagpole. Lon Wise did work in the garden surrounding the cabin. Our society sincerely thanks them for all of their efforts!

#### **CABIN IMPROVEMENTS**

Crosby Township officers and trustees have changed the monthly board meeting to one week prior to the regular monthly meeting. The board believes it will be advantageous to have their working meeting at a time separate from the regular meeting night. All members are welcome to attend.

#### **BYLAW REVISIONS**

Revision of CTHS's Constitution and Bylaws were adopted June 15, 2017. Many of the changes were simple such as word substitutions, additions, or removing sections. Some major changes were as follows: "Dissolution of the society shall be decided in a special meeting by a vote of a Quorum of the Board of Trustees and 60% of members attending the special meeting...". "The Society shall conduct its affairs in accordance with its non-profit status and shall not take any actions that shall jeopardize this status...". The classes of membership have been reduced to individual, family, life, and honorary. The section on membership dues was deleted. Finally, the description of the nominating committee and the hospitality committee was updated. Any member may request a copy of the Constitution and Bylaws.

#### PASSPORT TO THE PAST

Karen Kilgo and the Village Historical Society organized "Passport to the Past" at various local structures on Saturday, August 26<sup>th</sup>. The Whitewater Shaker buildings, Crosby Township Town Hall, the Passmore Cabin, and the Governor Othniel Looker House on Marvin Road were the venues. Greeters gave information on the building's history and offered refreshments. CTHS members hosted the town hall and the log cabin, boasting 34 guests. Visitors received a passport at the first dwelling and had it stamped at each of the other sites.

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## Stanley W. McClure, Historian



One of the most recognized names in Crosby Township's recent history is Stanley W. McClure. Stanley was locally born in 1905. He self-published numerous books on his own family history: The McClure Family" by Stanley W. McClure first published 1956; The Simonson Family" by Stanley W. McClure first published 1981; "The Wakefield Family of Crosby Township, Hamilton County, Ohio" by Stanley W. McClure, first published 1984; "Descendants of William Sater (1793-1849) Crosby Township, Hamilton County, Ohio," by Stanley W. McClure, first published 1886; and most notably to our organization, "The History of Crosby Township, Hamilton County, Ohio" by Stanley W. McClure, 1992.

However, many do not know that these writings, later in life, were preceded by works during his career with the National Park Service in Washington D.C.. From 1946 to 1952 McClure cataloged property in the White House for a booklet "The White House" which was often used by Secret Service Guides. This Washington D.C. theatre was purchased after President Lincoln's assassination and refitted by the federal government. It became the Records and Pension Bureau with an Army Museum on the third floor. In 1893, excavation in the basement destabilized the structure and three floors collapsed killing 22 clerks and injuring 68 of the Records and Pension Bureau. The building interior was reconstructed and converted into a museum of Lincoln artifacts. It was eventually transferred to the National Park Service. During the 1950s a bill was introduced in Congress to fund the restoration of Ford's Theatre to its 1865 appearance. Mr. McClure gives wonderful insight into Abraham Lincoln's death and surrounding events and into the restoration of this historic site during this time.

Stanley W. McClure lived here until his death in 1996. He was a native son who shared his talents nationally.
